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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

About the college

Simen Chapari College was established in 1994 with the efforts of the people of the Simen Chapori locality considering the necessity of an institute of higher studies owing to the increasing number of passed out students from Senior Secondary schools as well as for development of the society through the enlightenment of education. Besides this, the senior citizens opined that education can alone be the instrumental in bringing about social change and promote culture and human values. They also conceived the idea of setting up this institution for facilitating education to those who are being deprived of higher studies due to poor economic condition.

Simen Chapari College, now a premier institute of higher education, is located at Latitude, 27.710995 (North) and long' 94.883662 of Simen Chapori, under Jonai Sub-Division, Murkong Selek Tribal Development Block, Jonai, in the District of Dhemaji, Assam. It is affiliated to Dibrugarh University, Dibrugarh, Assam, and situated across the bordering area of Arunachal Pradesh, inhabited largely by the people of different tribes and ethnic groups having their distinct culture, tradition, religions and languages. The college is situated at a distance of 56 kilometers from Dhemaji, the district headquarter, and 72 kilometres from Dibrugarh town.

Since its inception, the college has been run under the able guidance and supervision of the Governing Body and with the cooperation of conscious people till the day of its provincialisation by the state government w.e.f.01-01-2013. The college authorities have invested their efforts well for impartment of co-educational quality education with parental care by creating sound educational environment among the students, providing pure and safe drinking water facility, spacious nature of classroom apartments, open air playground, greenish garden, guidance and counselling etc. Care is also taken for the growth of physical, mental and social health of the students through proper suggestion, interaction, workshops and training like yoga exercises and meditation.

The college came into existence on 23rd September, 1994. At present, the college offers Honours courses in 10 different subjects. The college is outfitted with all modern facilities within a picturesque campus.

Vision

Vision: The institution envisions for augmenting quality education through pragmatic approach with a view to improving socio-economic and cultural sides of the society.

development of society.

- To imbibe leadership qualities in students.
- To work for socio-economic and cultural development of the society.

To develop this college as one of the reputed institutes in the future.

Mission

The following facts reveal the mission of our college:

- The main objective of the college is to make the students aware of the present day world competitiveness in various professions.
- To make the teaching learning process more student-centric.
- We keep interest for quality enhancement in the professional development of the faculties.
- The college determines to support students in the development of their personality engaging them in the different co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- The college has been playing a pivotal role in acquainting students with the new trends of learning.

We also devote our time and energy for bringing about the innate potentialities of the learners through team work as well as academic activities.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The institution has sufficient number of dedicated teaching and non-teaching staff and satisfactory number of students.

The college has a well-stocked central library, departmental libraries etc. It provides free internet and Wi-Fi facilities for office staff within college campus, girls' hostel, LCD Projectors, Smart classrooms, Computer Lab cum ICT and other resources, and well-constructed playground, pure and safe drinking water facility, unique initiation of Ground Water Recharging System, girls' common room, boys' common room etc. we have one Open Cultural Stage, an Indoor stadium for sports such as Gym, Badminton, Table Tennis with attached washroom facilities. Running water facility is also made available across the stadium. Parking facility is available for both teachers and students. Tree plantation is done around the campus with the maintenance of cleanliness. The Career Guidance Cell organizes workshop and other programs for students' enrichment. The college has an Alumni association. The college runs a hygienic Canteen within the campus. In cooperation with teachers, the Principal works for effective implementation of the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university.

The outcome of the college is reflected in the academic performance of the students as well as progression to higher studies and placement. Students are encouraged to interact with eminent personalities of different field, students of the other college and community members.

Apart from organizing seminar, workshop, lecture, the institution encourages its faculty members to get involved in Research work.

The IQAC is continuously involved in enhancing the quality education and it is supported by management and the stake holders in the formulation and implementation of its policies.

Students are encouraged to publish their creative thoughts, writings in the form of annual college magazine and the wall-magazines. The different Cells and committees as well as the IQAC are actively engaged in different student centric activities.

Faculty co-operation in administrative decision making and vice-versa bears a harmonious relationship. Teachers and students are involved in social services and different extension activities under the guidance of NSS and various Cells of the college.

Students are equally involved in curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Institutional Weakness

Some of the institutional weaknesses are :-

- * One of the disadvantages of the institution includes no freedom to formulate a curriculum of its own, because it is fully designed by the affiliating University and the College has no choice in this aspect.
- * Insufficient fund to set up boys' hostel and sufficient faculty engagement.
- * The college is situated in rural based area.
- * Some students are dropped out due to poor economic conditions, disinterestedness towards higher education owing to some young people's interest in early engagement in work and early marriage.
- * No any additional UG programme or certificate courses so far.
- * More than 36% of posts are not still sanctioned although regular in service status.
- * Faculties involved in research activities are less in number. Still we are unable to organize national/international level seminars/workshops/ conference etc. except 2 nos. of National Level Seminars organized in the year 2014 by the education department of the college and also the organization of Webinar on 'The Language, Literature and Culture of Hazong Tribe; An Overview' organized by Centre For Ethnic Studies And Research (CESR), Guwahati, in collaboration with the Assamese department, Simen Chapari

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College.

* Presently, no research projects done by the faculty members.

Institutional Opportunity

- *The reputation of the college since its inception and the ability to live up to the stated vision and mission has placed it in great demand throughout the region. Therefore, the institution can expand through introduction of Major in the Non-Major subjects, venue Centre for PG courses in some of the departments and offer skill based courses.
- *It can also develop soft skill and inter-personal competency of students. Training Program such as tourism, Organic tea plantation, bamboo plantation, paddy crops etc. can be introduced.
- *Further overall development can be done with required equipment and software.
- *The faculty members may avail the research facilities offered by various funding agencies.
- *For widening the scope of employment, short term courses or workshops can be organized.
- *There is greater possibility of networking among the alumni.
- *The institution can strive to eliminate the infrastructural inadequacies by submitting proposals for sanctioning grants from RUSA, Govt. of Assam, etc. stakeholders

Institutional Challenge

- *The teachers are under pressure in completing their courses wholeheartedly because regular classes are often hampered by their involvement in other govt. duties like Election, Gunotsav, etc.
- *One of the major challenges is to increase the involvement of parents and alumni in different activities.
- * The college has the challenges to increase the enrollment of students, empower quality education and minimize the rate of drop out students.
- * Yet to motivate students to pursue higher education in a satisfactory level.
- * To encourage research/project work/field study/extension activity in the days to come.
- * To inspire students for national/state level competitive examinations.
- * We have to go a long way towards enriching students in the field of Games and Sports, culture and human values.

- * To organize workshops for teachers for capacity building.
- * To familiarize students towards changing patterns of society and culture.
- * Fulfilling needs and educational opportunities for marginalized students.
- * To attract students for employability in the areas of self-employment/ entrepreneurship.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Simen Chapari College is affiliated to Dibrugarh University, Assam. The curriculum is generally designed and prepared by the affiliating university. The college offers BA Choice Based Credit System programme in ten subjects (Honours) i.e., Assamese, English, History, Philosophy, Economics, Political Science, Bodo, Sociology, Education and Mathematics (from the session 2021-22).

The college provides ample opportunities to the backward classes including SC/ST/OBC and students from Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur etc. Some students have achieved brilliant success in their examinations. The affiliating University provides entire course syllabus, duration of the session, the date of examinations, question papers, etc.

The institution encourages the faculty members to go for research, attend RC/OP in their respective subjects, to participate National and International seminar, conference, workshop etc. to present their research papers. The college also encourages them to publish those papers.

For effective curriculum delivery and classroom transaction, all the teaching departments prepare their own lesson plans for both the general and major course which include lecture hours, topics to be taught and other co-curricular activities to be conducted during the academic session and the progress is regularly monitored by the heads of the departments.

On the basis of theoretical knowledge, socio-economic surveys, project works etc. are conducted by the students. At the end of every academic session/course completion, overviews and reviews on examination results at different levels are done by the authorities in the academic committee meetings. The college encourages the faculty members to work for innovative teaching-learning process through conduct of seminars, symposiums etc. in collaboration with NGOs and local bodies.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college website or the prospectus provides all relevant information about admission, institutional facilities,

rules and regulations etc. at the time of admission. The admission is given on the basis of merit in the previous examination, viva-voce and written test. The college offers opportunities to the students of SC, ST, OBC etc. abiding by the directives of the Govt. of Assam and the Dibrugarh University. Scholarships and other concessions are provided to the economically weaker students. The detailed layout of the teaching plan is outlined in the college Academic Calendar. The college has efficient and dedicated group of teachers. Teachers participate in seminars, workshops, conferences organized by the various institutions. The faculty members adopt innovative approaches to teaching-learning process by introducing Internet, LCD projector, fieldwork, socio-economic surveys. The college has also provided a Computer Lab and Language Lab. Students are guided by the academic, personal and psycho-social support and other services by the faculty members and various cells. The college library collects books and various journals, newspapers, with the funds granted by the authorities. Books necessary for preparation for competitive examinations, internet facilities are provided to the students. Syllabus, question papers of the College and University examinations are kept in the library. Almost all the departments have their own departmental libraries. Career Guidance & Counseling Cell helps students to cope with the demands of competitive examinations. The teaching-learning atmosphere prevailing in this institution and the good percentage of results attracts the students every year. The institute monitors the quality of teaching-learning outcome through IQAC and other relevant cells, which collect feedback from the students and other stake holders. Parents-teachers meetings are held regularly. Awards in the form of cash, books and certificates are given away to students as a result of satisfactory performance.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Simen Chapari College has constituted a Research Committee to encourage and extend all possible helps to the researchers to promote research works and development. Of course, minimum infrastructure facilities are provided by the institution for research works. Internet and Reference books are made available to all faculty members to facilitate research works in the college library. Teachers are encouraged to pursue minor/major research projects. Seminars are organized by the departments in the classes. Some numbers of faculty members have been awarded Ph. D, M. Phil Degree by various Universities of Assam and other Universities of India. At present, some faculty members are enrolled in different universities of the state for pursuing their Ph.D. work. A countable few faculty members have presented papers in national seminars. Faculty members have presented a good number of research papers in various National Seminars through their individual capacity and in collaboration with associates which are published in the proceedings of the relevant seminars. There are also other publications like chapters edited in books, journals etc. The college provides the facilities of Photostat, computer and printing work.

The college is involved in extension activities in different categories like community development, Social work, Health awareness, Health camp, Blood donation camp, Environment awareness, Gender sensitization etc. Organization of blood donation camps, AIDS awareness programme etc. are the works related to community orientation. The NSS Unit organizes extension programme like cleaning, tree plantation and other social activities. The Women's Cell addresses issues related to women staff and girl's students giving importance in gender equality and gender sanitization. It takes initiatives for guidance and counselling for girl students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The total area of the college campus is 27.8925615 acre (45 Bighas). The total built-up area is 4593.14 (in sq.m). The college has provided sufficient class room apartments to teach all subjects simultaneously. All the rooms are connected with electricity (fan facility and others) and pure and safe drinking water supply. The

college has digital classrooms equipped with modern facilities like LCD, overhead projectors etc. Moreover, proper sanitation and toilet facilities are provided for teaching, non-teaching and the students' community. There are available number of blackboards, lecture stands, desks and benches for conducting smooth teaching learning activities. The college has facilitated well accommodated staff common room, departmental rooms, administrative room with sanitation, one store room, guest room, two nos. of girls' hostels, girls' common room, indoor stadium, spacious nature of open air playground, NSS Nursery garden and a hygienic canteen. The institution has provided a Badminton Court, Gym and Table Tennis in the indoor stadium. The newly built central library of the college is well equipped with 3.0 Soul System and e-resources. The total library Books now stands at the strength of not less than 15000 numbers with complete Accession Numbering System. A powerful generator has been installed in 2013. The availability of these facilities of infrastructure and resources have been made possible with the help of the sanctioning and grants received from the esteemed UGC, Govt. of Assam, MP's & MLA's local area development fund and local donors and also to some extent from the college's own resources.

Student Support and Progression

Information viz. admission procedure, fee structure, library facilities, attendance rules, courses offered, financial and student support services etc. are clearly mentioned in the prospectus. The college publishes an annual magazine which disseminates various information viz. infrastructural establishments, student activities, academic achievements etc. The college has also its own website http://www.simenchaporicollege.org.

Scholarship is given to the SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker sections of the society by the State and central government. The college provides free admission to the desiring and deserving students.

Special coaching and guidance are provided by the institution in Games and Sports. There are provisions for providing financial assistance and other necessary facilities to such students. Health camps are organized by the college to create awareness about health among the students. The faculty members also personally help in career concerns.

For skill development, computer training is imparted. Free coaching in volleyball, kabaddi, Taekowndo are given to the students. There are provisions for tutorial classes for the slow learners. Practice teaching in Spoken English is imparted to the interested learners.

The institution collects feedback from each batch of outgoing students. The information data supported by them are used for improvement of teaching-learning process and the infrastructure development.

In the field of publication, the college publishes its wall magazines, Departmental Wall Magazines and Annual college magazine "Saswata" along with "Geremsa" published by Bodo Students Literary Society.

The college has a body of Students' Union under the guidance of the Principal. The Alumni Association of the college keeps records of the alumnus and keeps in contact with them.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The objective of the college is to facilitate quality education to students that come from socially and economically poor rural background. We, especially take care in bringing about harmonious relationships

among students with the attitude of gender equality and moral values.

The Governing Body of the college is the highest decision making authority with the Principal as its Secretary. The Principal plays the leading role in the governance and management of the institution. The college has an efficient internal management system under the leadership of the Principal for designing and implementation of its policies and plans effectively through the various committees constituted by the GB. The college authority sincerely follows the government rules and regulations in matters relating to appointment, admission, utilization of funds, and also the rules mandatory for all colleges under the guidance of UGC. The college is controlled and monitored by Directorate of Higher Education of Assam. All the stakeholders –students, teachers, parents, local persons, govt./non-govt. bodies etc. participate actively and cordially in institutional plans abiding by the stipulated norms and conditions. Thus, dynamic leadership and effective administrative system promotes cooperation, sharing of knowledge and innovations in the institution. The development of the institution comprises extension of building, providing additional facilities, introduction of new courses. The college arranges confidential evaluation of the faculty members and the overall institutional performance by the students through feedback which is perused by the Principal, and then he takes necessary actions/initiatives for further improvement of the facilities offered by the institution. Those who are employed on adhoc/contractual basis are offered a consolidated pay. Income/expenditure is closely monitored by the Principal. IQAC of the college plays a pivotal rule in leadership and management field.

The college has presently been communicating with Krishi Vikash Kendra and industrial sectors for providing training to students and local people for enrichment of the locality.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Simen Chapari College has given utmost importance in implementing gender equality with social justice. The women cell in coordination with the teachers of the college works for women students giving importance to the fact of gender sensitization and equity as well as for women empowerment and capacity building. We work for promotion of the gender equity by organizing International Women Day, Children Day, workshops on Human Rights with the efforts of the Education department, Political Science department and by dint of various cells of the college. The door of the college is kept open for the students of neighbouring state i.e. Arunachal, Manipur etc. The institution has installed LED Bulbs and Solar energy for the means of energy conservation in the campus and two nos. of girls' hostels for facilitating students of far off places. The institution has the accommodation of Solid Waste Management System and E-Waste Management System. The plastic materials or polythene bags in the outside or inside of the campus are decomposed of regularly. The dry leaves are swept away regularly for cleanliness and they are deposited in some places to manure the grounds of the green trees. The institution has disabled-friendly environment. For almost all the rooms and hostel verandas are surrounded by ramps with the availability of visitor's room.

The Departments of the College organize project study, motivational programs, English Speech practices, communication skill program, and emotional guidance etc. for all round development of students. Campus is made garbage free, anti-ragging free and pollution free for enhancement of better learning facility.

Continuous and comprehensive evaluation is applied to assess the learning outcome of students. The college IQAC also keeps cumulative records on the internal examinations of the students in systematic order. The students' progress report is also recorded in concerned department files. 3. The curriculum for UG level deals with cross cutting issues like gender, human values, environment and professional ethics. To promote environmental awareness among students, the paper for study on Environmental Studies is made compulsory by the esteemed Dibrugarh University in 3rd Semester of UG

level.

Syllabus of both Assamese and Bodo covers issues related to culture and human values. Drama, novels, short stories, poetry, literature included in the curriculum aim to develop healthy, positive attitudes in students. The curriculum of Economics covers environmental issues like ecology, sustainability, biodiversity etc. It has a complete paper on Environmental Economics. The department of Education has elective papers on value education, Gender Education and Human Rights. The entire course of Education department includes topics like women education, mental health, human rights, world peace, past heritage, adjustment, equality, environment etc. The curriculum of English includes papers like Indian Classical Literature, Women's writing, Popular literature, Literature of the Indian Diaspora and Partition Literature etc. that are quite relevant to the human values, feminism, gender issues and ethical values. Syllabus of Political Science deals with the issues like democracy, human rights, equality, justice, freedom movement, decentralization, multiculturalism etc. The papers of Philosophy department i.e. Indian Ethics, Western Ethics, Applied Ethics, Philosophy of Feminism are devoted to feminism, ethics and moral values. The department of Sociology has a complete paper on Sociology of Gender. Environmental Sociology is also a paper on environmental issues. The entire course of Sociology covers society, multilingualism, multiculturalism, diversity, equality, social movement, modernization, social stratification, social status, social mobility, social development etc. C-12 paper of History department is concerned with "Women in Indian History', "History of Ecology and Environment in India' which is an optional paper of 3rd semester.

IQAC, NSS, Students Union, Women cell, Teachers' Unit, Rangers and Rovers Group are actively involved in on campus and off campus activities on environmental issues. The college regularly celebrates International Yoga day, World Environment day, Independence day, Republic day, Human Rights day, Independence day, AIDS day, Constitution day, Forest Day, Earth Day etc. to promote environmental awareness, human values and professional ethics among students.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

The College always emphasises on how the learning be made more student centric. In addition to chalk and talk method, the lecture method is occasionally supplemented by overhead projector, power-point and LCD projectors.

The strategies are given below:

- * The digital class room is provided for facilitating the knoledge of ICT for the teachers and students alike.
- * The faculties of Third Eye Computer Education provide training on computer skills to teachers, non-teaching staff and students.
- * The students participate in extensions programs whereby they learn something.
- * Group discussion, seminar, educational tours to academic institutions and historical places are also some of the measures to make learning more student-centric.
- * A few teachers have published text and reference books,
- * Another innovative mechanism is 'INTERACTIVE LEARNING'. The teachers try to develop personal contacts with the students and allow interaction with them after the class in their respective departments.
- * Vernacular Medium is used sometimes to aid the smooth understanding of the students. Questions

relating to the syllabus and other relevant questions are discussed inside the classroom.

- * Organization of Field study by the departments enhances their knowledge of field survey.
- * Participatory learning activities such as wall magazine, annual magazine, project work, assignments, and extracurricular activities of NSS etc. are regularly conducted.
- * For improvement of communication skill in English, interaction is held by dividing students in peer groups.
- * For further enhance of communication skills, departmental seminars are held and the students have been encouraged to select topics of their own, or among the topics given by the teacher.
- * Simen Chapari College Student Union organizes "College Week" and Freshers' Meet which is a platform to search potent talents of the students in different aspects.
- * To encourage the students, the college annually presents an award i.e. "College Best Graduate Award". Moreover, the meritorious students are also felicitated.
- * During the college week, various competitions are held in culture, music literature, athletics, indoor and outdoor games etc. And also, Simen SCCSU under the Chairmanship of the Principal publishes a magazine annually through which the creativity is nurtured. The students publish their creative writing in the "Wall Magazine", in hand written form. The mentors in general, decode different types of knowledge such as ICT soft skills, and skills of different works from time to time
- * Teachers make use of ICT Tools like projectors. Digital Broads, etc.
- * Topics relating to the syllabus are again and again discussed and interacted in the classroom.
- * Different programmes like recitation, quiz, assignment, extempore speech etc. are organized to make the process of learning more interesting.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The University frames all the rules and regulations regarding the evaluation process in the meeting of "Board of Studies" and "Academic Council" and circulate the resolutions to all the affiliating colleges. The principal also provides the copies of resolutions to the HODs and ensures that the faculty is aware of the matter. The principal convenes general meeting of the faculty members and appraises the evaluation process through discussion. Consequently, the faculty members also apprise the students in their respective

classes. In the semester course, the University reserves the right to set questions of 80% marks in each paper in end semester examinations and the rest 20% marks for internal marks to be evaluated by the colleges. This 20% are accrued of 5% from 1st sessional, 5% from 2nd sessional examination, 5% from students' attendance and 5% from seminar / GD / assignments etc. The college ensures the effective implementation of the sessional marks through in-semester examinations; seminar/GD /Assignments and strict norms of students' attendance. Under the support and guidance of the college academic board constituted of all the heads of the departments, the examination procedure for sessional examinations/internal examinations are framed in cooperation with all the faculty members. All the examination halls/rooms are kept under the purview of CCTV cameras. All teachers are assigned accordingly to set question papers in printed form from the Units taught up to the time and discuss some of the referential issues in the classes. Routine is provided before the start of the examinations. Examinations are conducted and evaluated by the concerned teachers. The result is declared and students are let to know about their secured marks.

If any grievance from the students arises for their dissatisfaction with the secured marks in the sessional examination, provision is also kept for students to see their answer scripts and as well as for rechecking of the same by the teachers. Utmost attention is given for facilitating them with question papers and answer scripts in time so that they need not waste time in the examination hall. Care is also taken for the diseased examinees with the facility of First Aid or taken to the nearby public health centre in matters of seriousness.

The College has Career Counselling Cell which organizes Counselling sessions for the students of this rural region for enrichment and enlightenment in the areas of knowledge and career building. Simen Chapari College organized a week long camp of NSS Unit at the adopted village Somkong Narayanpur Rabha village, on the theme "Health, Public Sanitation and personal hygiene from 6-12-2017 to 10-12-2017, emphasizing on awareness drive relating to maternity health and Public Sanitation and Personal Hygiene, with the participation of 50 no's of NSS volunteers. The College organized special NSS camp at RVC Tinikunia village from 27-1-2019 to 31-1-2019 on the theme, "Education, Literacy and Conservation of Cultural heritage" with 45 Nos. of NSS Volunteers.

The institution has issued ID cards to the students and all teaching and non-teaching staff with valid date, containing name, photograph, and address to ensure safe entry and passage into other organizations and also to identify whenever necessary. The College has established Anti-ragging Cell and Anti Sexual Harassment Cell to develop guidelines and norms for a policy against sexual harassment. different tribes and ethnic communities. Considering this fact, the IQAC, Women Cell and NSS of the institution carry out some of the activities such as celebration of International Women Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, and Saraswati Puja, arranging flood relief camp, Teachers' Day, Fresher's Day, Cultural Programmes like traditional dress competitions on different ethnic groups, literary arrangement and involvement in programmes of social activities.

Every year the College observes 'College Week' arranging different Sports and Cultural Competitions like Bride Competition (students present themselves as brides of different Communities), Major and Minor games, Multi-Cultural Procession, Speech Competition, Songs and Dances. Students from different places with diverse Cultural and Linguistic background participate in it and the successful students are awarded with medals and certificates. The NSS Unit of the College has performed activities such as tree plantation and clean drive programme. The Women Cell of the College organizes Competitions like Embroidery, Hand Spinning, Cooking, Singing and Dancing among the students and women of the locality.

Extension programme on health & hygienic, education and social activities are conducted in different times by going to the neighboring localities such as Somkong, Tinikonia LPS etc. Motivational and devotional programmes are quite often held at the college premises under the initiative of Education and Assamese department in coordination with the faculties and Yoga Cell. (i) Title of the practice: Community Service Programme

Objectives of the Practice:

1. To increase the sense of social responsibility, a global view of society and a will for helping others,

citizenship, leadership quality and democratic attitude among the students.

- 2. To acquaint the needs, problems of neighborhood and strive to find out the solution of community problems.
- 3. To extend ground level understanding and develop the ability of creativity and critical judgment among students.
- 4. To develop the quality of radiant personality like quality of sympathy, truthfulness, morality, sense of service, communication skills.
- 5. To make the community members aware of aspects of health and hygiene, government development schemes and life skills etc.

Context:

Simen Chapari College is situated in a rural based area surrounded by charming hills, green forest and Simen River inhabited by different tribes and communities. Most of the inhabitants are from the socio-economical hazards like poverty, illiteracy, unemployment and marginalized from the main stream of development.

The overall development of a backward area cannot be ensured and achieved without the development of socio-economically marginalized section of the society. So far as the Simen Chapari College is located at such backward area it is high time to complement to the Government efforts in matter of awareness drive and ensuring peoples' participation in the process of development.

The Practices:

Simen Chapari College aims at providing higher education to the students of such remote locality. The institution is responsible towards the society for arranging various programmes at various levels for giving a helping hand in the process of socio-economic and educational development. So the college organizes special camps at different places and other extension activities in the neighbouring villages and schools. Five Days' Special Camp on Health, Public Sanitation & Personal Hygiene and also another 5 Days' Special camp on Education, Literacy & Conservation of Cultural Heritage has been organized by the NSS Unit of Simen Chapari College. The 4th International Yoga Day has been observed at Panchim Adharsa High School under NSS. Swachhata Pakhwada has also been organized by NSS both inside and outside of the campus. Fund collection for distribution of essential commodities for flood affected people and also clean drive at simen river picnic spot have been the some other examples. The college adopted Koivatra village under the initiative of education department and has also organized clean drive programmes at local market places, and different school grounds and road sides. The college community is also involved in distribution of woollen cloths for the comfort of people during winter seasons and in prevention/protection of village areas from soil erosion due to the flood in summer season through construction of bamboo dams at place like Rongpuria village. Health awareness camps as well as educational extension activities are organized at Somkong High School and Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidaylaya. Mentoring classes for development of communication skills among students, has been imparted through the guidance of Sir Krishna Bhujel, HoD of English department in 2018, in the mechanical and electrical engineering courses of the Dhemaji Polytechnic Institute, Simen Chapori. Awareness camps against drug abuse, AIDS, COVID-19 and Cyber Security etc. have been our agendas toward community service. All the teachers

individually as well as under the umbrella of NSS Unit, and the college authorities have been engaged willingly for providing food packages to the poor and needy people of the society during the days of pandemic situation of COVID-19.

Evidence of success:

The people of neighbouring villages including educationists, teachers and senior citizens of different castes and communities always provide their support and cooperation as well as keep their positive interest in institutional matters like annual college week functions, distribution ceremonies, awareness programme, cultural programme, training and entrepreneurship, quality enhancement activities and other nature of community services held or conducted by different cells of the college within the ambit of the college authorities. They also actively participate in the relief camps, distribution of food packages and dam making works, college motivational programmes, talks on women empowerment, workshops on Human Rights, Bishnu Rabha Divas and the Birth Anniversary of Dr. Bhupen Hazorika and so on. In other programmes like workshops on 'Teaching English in Secondary Level School', many teachers from different schools under Jonai Sub-Division have actively participated in all the four days programme. They also admitted their benefit from this programme.

Problems Encountered And Resources Required:

Sometimes, the institution has to face certain problems to implement the action taken out in its plans because of bad weather. Other reasons may be highlighted here such as tight schedule of CBCS semester system, short duration of each semester, semester breaks and evaluation process, busy schedule of the village life, unawareness of some local members and also shortage of fund in the college. Except the fund under NSS, we are still unable to have financial support from other agencies.

Even still we are not pacing back from undertaking institutional strategies and plans for extension of community services. For instance, we have been communicating with some local NGOs, Krishi Bigyan Kendra, District Industries & Commerce for collaborative works to channelize training programmes for students as well as rural masses with a view to creating self-employable conditions.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Since the day of the establishment of Simen Chapari College, all the academic, co-curricular as well as extra-curricular activities have been carried on in commensurate with the motto, "Voyage Towards Knowledge, Truth, Unity and Prosperity". Paying respect to the motto, the priority and thrust has been unanimously given for 'Self -Reliance through Education' as the institutional distinctiveness.

Simen Chapari College has been established in the year 1994 with the noble efforts of the local people and the educationists. The institution has sacrificed the experience of visiting to neighbouring villages for motivating the local guardians to send their students to take higher education. Besides this, since the establishment of this institution, the college management extended admission facilities in credit or in instalment system, especially to the poor students till the date of its provincialization (w.e.f. 2013) as well as tuition fees were waived off for their education. At present, the institution has made availability of some modern facilities necessary for higher educational institutions like separate library building, indoor stadium, girls' hostel, outdoor Open Air Playground, College Canteen and many other such student supporting facilities. Medium of instruction is in bi-lingual mode because majority of the students are from different Vernacular mediums. The institution organizes workshop and seminars to excel the teaching learning activities for all-round development of the students.

The greater purpose of Simen Chapari College is to fulfill the dreams and desires of the students. The main attempt and focus since the birth of the institution is to create a suitable academic environment for educational values. With regard to value education, all the faculty members have been giving their untiring effort in providing knowledge of community services, unity and fraternity, physical and mental health, competition and cooperation, skills of personality development in matters of employable condition. With such objectives of orienting self-reliance in students the institution has been ceaselessly working since the initial stage in conjunction with the Bodies and Cells under the administration since long ago.

The NSS:

The National Service Scheme unit of Simen Chapari College has been sincerely engaged in training the students for infusing the ideas of the benefits of team work through cooperation in social activities. Many interested students have been enrolled as volunteers for giving a helping hand in community services.

Special camps, relief programme, tree plantation and other workshops are organized for providing knowledge and practical experience in the field of adjustment and unity.

Career Guidance & Counselling Cell:

Since 2016-2017, the Career Guidance & Counselling Cell of the college has been organizing

various awareness programmes on physical and mental health, personality development and entry into service, HIV/AIDS, Cyber Security, appearing in IAS Examination and workshops on the improvement of the English language and communication skills for teachers and students. Through such programmes, students are also given the ideas of ethical and moral values.

English Literary Forum and Boro Students' Literary Society:

The contribution of English Literary Forum and Boro Students' Literary Society are equally enervating in organizing the body of the forum in every year with a purpose to infuse the knowledge of sincerity and devotion to work for the people and also to bolster up the potentialities of the students in the areas of literature and culture. The Boro Students' Literary Society is also able to publish annual magazine 'Geremsa' and convene 'Poets' Meet' on the days of convenience, sometime, in support with English Department. Both the departments publish the departmental wall magazines through these forums with the objective of bringing about the inherent talents among students in different genres of literature.

Political Science students' Study Circle:

The political science department of the college has constituted a Study Circle with the objective of making students aware of the ideas of equality and fraternity, liberty and human rights, democratic sentiment and republicanism as well as the societal norms so that they may be the successful citizens in the future in becoming a part for contributing to the national development.
